Scholarship Opens for Marine Science Educational Advancement

United Way of Collier and the Keys to award scholarships for marine science students

Florida Keys — United Way of Collier and the Keys (UWCK) continues to blaze the trail that supports the Florida Keys community and its investment in the marine environment. Now in its second year, UWCK has opened its 2023 Marine Science Educational Advancement Scholarship for Monroe County residents pursuing marine science related studies.

Last year UWCK awarded 6 scholarships to students throughout the Florida Keys. With these scholarships the recipients have been afforded opportunities for success, including Key West residents Gracia Rojas and Cricket Desmarais. Gracia completed an EPP/MSI funded research study titled "Effects of direct removal on the population dynamics of corallivorous snails" and was on the College of the Florida Keys President's List in the fall of 2022. Using her marine science education and experience in Creative Writing, Cricket has recently taken a position as NOAA's Communications Coordinator for Mission: Iconic Reefs.

A Scholarship Committee will review the applicants, taking into consideration educational achievement, career objectives, school activities, references, and financial status. Priority will be given to students already participating in this work and demonstrating financial need. The application period is now open and has been

As part of UWCK's *Revitalizing the Florida Keys Through Reef Restoration and Beyond* efforts, the scholarship initiative will increase marine science related employment opportunities for local students.
